
Welcome to <u>Radio Bristol Book Club</u> where readers from BCM and the <u>Bristol Public</u> <u>Library</u> come together each month to celebrate and explore books inspired by our region's rich Appalachian cultural and musical heritage! We invite you to read along and then listen to <u>Radio Bristol</u> on the fourth Thursday of each month at 12:00 noon when we dig deep into the themes and questions raised by the books, learn more about the authors, and celebrate the joys of being a bookworm!

Dopesick: Dealers, Doctors, and the Drug Company that Addicted America is a New York Times bestselling book by journalist Beth Macy. Published in 2018, Dopesick dives into the moral and political crisis surrounding the decades long opioid addiction pandemic that has swept through North America and particularly, Appalachia. Through candid and gripping portraits of those directly affected, Macy paints the picture of a disillusioned Appalachia that is in a state of emergency. Macey follows the pandemic from the release of OxyContin by Purdue Pharma in 1996 and traces the devastation from big pharma marketing departments to local doctor's offices to wealthy suburbs, inner-city communities, and once-idyllic small towns. Dopesick details how America has learned to embrace the cultural norm of overtreatment with painkillers creating a drug abuse crisis that defies geographic, political, and class lines.



Beth Macey is a Roanoke, Virginia based journalist. She has won more than two dozen national journalism awards. In 2021, she worked with producer Danny Strong to bring *Dopesick* to life through a Peabody Award-winning Hulu miniseries based on her book and starring Michael Keaton. In addition to Dopesick, Macey has published three other books. *Factory Man: How One Furniture Maker Battled Offshoring, Stayed Local—and Helped Save an American Town* and Truevine: Two Brothers, a Kidnapping, and a Mother's Quest: A True Story of the Jim Crow South, and Dopesick: Dealers, Doctors, and the Drug Company that Addicted America have all been named New York Times Bestsellers. In August of 2022 she published her newest book - *Raising Lazarus: Hope, Justice, and the Future of America's Overdose Crisis,* a follow-up to Dopesick detailing the second wave of America's overdose crisis. Where Dopesick charts the rise of prescription painkillers, *Raising Lazarus* looks at what can and is being done to prevent opioid abuse and hold the pharmaceutical industry responsible.
