

#### Will You Miss Me When I'm Gone? The Carter Family & Their Legacy in American Music by Mark Zwonitzer with Charles Hirshberg




#### Anchored in Love: an Intimate Portrait of June Carter Cash by John Carter Cash

June Carter's only son wrote this loving but honest tribute to his mother. He describes her early life, her marriage to Johnny Cash and the various family problems they faced.

#### The Carter Family: Don't Forget This Song by Frank Young & David Lasky

This graphic novel treatment of the Carters' story is surprisingly evocative in its use of minimalist drawings and limited color. A CD is included with some of their most popular songs.

#### The Bristol Sessions: Writings about the Big Bang of Country Music edited by Charles K. **Wolfe and Ted Olson**

This is a collection of essays about the conditions that made the famed sessions possible and about those who participated.

#### Man of Constant Sorrow: My Life and Times by Ralph Stanley with Eddie Dean

This is a very entertaining, readable book full of fascinating details about the Stanley family, Ralph, traditional music, and a way of life.


#### Traveling the High Wav Home: Ralph Stanley and the World of Traditional Bluegrass Music by John Wright


Although the Stanley Brothers' music is the focus of the book, bluegrass fan Wright interviewed a variety of musicians and fans to produce a story told by those who know it best, including Larry Sparks, Curly Ray Cline and Charlie Sizemore.

#### **Lost Highway: The True Story of Country Music by Colin Escott**

This companion to the BBC series about the history of country music covers bluegrass, honky-tonk, the Bakersfield sound, Nashville, and the Bristol Sessions.

#### **Dolly on Dolly: Interviews and Encounters is** part of the "Musicians in their own words" series and reprints Dolly Parton interviews from such sources as The Tennessean, Ladies Home





#### **Smoky Mountain Memories: Stories from the** Hearts of the Parton Family by Willadeene

Parton is an intimate look at Dolly and her family, including family photographs and anecdotes.

#### Singing Family of the Cumberlands by Jean Ritchie

Born in Viper, Kentucky, Ritchie became one of the best-known names in folk music with songs learned from her parents and other relatives. Her autobiography describes in rich detail growing up in the mountains during the Depression with little in the way of material goods but surrounded by music and family.

#### Rural Roots of Bluegrass: Songs, Stories & **History by Wayne Erbsen**

This is a gem of a book which traces the history of some traditional Appalachian songs and singers. Words and music to some songs are included as are some vintage photographs. It's a great book for browsing; the tone is conversational and engaging.

# If Trouble Don't Kill Me: A Family's Story of Brotherhood, War, and Bluegrass by Ralph Berrier, Jr.

Twins Clayton and Saford Hall had embarked on a career in bluegrass music with some success when World War II intervened. Berrier, a grandson, writes candidly about his grandfather and great-uncle. Funny, poignant and honest, this is a good book for anyone interested in the Appalachian region and its music.

## A Guide to the Crooked Road: Virginia's Heritage Music Trail by Joe Wilson

Not just a list of places, Wilson's book gives a bit of history about the music of the region as well as a personal view of some not to be missed people and music venues. Two music CDs are included with songs from the Carter Family, Ralph Stanley, Dock Boggs, and others.

# The Rose & the Briar: Death, Love and Liberty in the American Ballad edited by Sean Wilentz and Greil Marcus

Ballads traditional and modern are the subject of essays by author and artists. Read Joyce Carol Oates' take on "Little Maggie," David Thomas' comparison of "The Wreck of the Old 97" and "Deadman's Curve," an examination of the history of "Barbara Allen" and Sharyn McCrumb's on traditional songs and singers.

# In the Country of Country: People and Places in American Music by Nicholas Dawidoff




### Well of Souls: Uncovering the Banjo's Hidden History by Kristina R. Gaddy


# Ralph Peer and the Making of Popular Music by Barry Mazor




# Ain't No Grave: The Life and Legacy of Brother Claude Ely by Macel Ely

Born in Lee County, Virginia, Ely was a Holiness preacher and musician whose song "Ain't No Grave" was covered by numerous artists including Elvis and Johnny Cash. His nephew Macel spent hundreds of hours interviewing people in the Appalachian region to produce this biography.
